Summary

This report presents statistics on the Australian residential aged care system over the period 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008.

Major changes in appraisal of resident care needs and health conditions

From 20 March 2008 a new method of appraising the care needs of permanent residents was introduced. The Aged Care Funding Instrument (ACFI) replaced the Resident Classification Scale (RCS). The ACFI is designed to measure a resident's need for care rather than the care provided. It underpins a new set of funding arrangements in residential aged care designed to reflect the costs associated with such care.

This report includes data about the 47,338 residents who had received an ACFI appraisal by 30 June 2008. Over three-quarters of these residents (76%) were classified as high care.

For the first time, this report includes data about the health conditions of permanent residents with an ACFI appraisal. Almost half (48%) had a recorded diagnosis of dementia. Other recorded health conditions affecting residents included circulatory diseases (14,000 residents) and diseases of the musculoskeletal and connective tissue (8,200 residents).

Aged care provision continues to increase

At 30 June 2008, there were 175,472 residential aged care places, an increase of 5,401 compared with 30 June 2007. The current planning target for residential aged care provision is 88 places per 1,000 persons aged 70 years and over. Although it is intended that this will be achieved by June 2011, the target was close to being achieved by June 2008 when there were 87.7 operational places per 1,000 persons (up from 86.9 at 30 June 2007).

Including other aged care programs such as aged care packages in the community, the corresponding ratio of available places and packages increased from 109.5 to 111.9 during the 12-month period to 30 June 2008, relative to the overall planning target of 113 places and packages per 1,000 persons aged 70 or over. Current planning has set this target to also be achieved by June 2011.

Average occupancy in residential aged care from 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008 was 93.5% compared to 94.3% in the previous year.

Average length of stay continues to increase

There were 105,030 admissions to residential aged care between 1 July 2007 and 30 June 2008, of which 53,737 were for permanent care. During the same period there were 53,819 separations from permanent care, with the most common reason for separation being death (88%).

On average, the length of time people spend in residential aged care is increasing. The average completed length of stay for permanent residents who left residential aged care during 2007–08 was 147.8 weeks compared with 131.3 weeks in 1998–99 and 145.9 weeks in 2006–07. Length of stay was longer for women (170.4 weeks) than for men (109.8 weeks).

Respite care is an important component of residential service provision

While at any one time the number of respite residents is small, almost half (49%) of admissions to residential aged care during 2007–08 were for respite care. Respite care is usually of short duration with an average length of stay of 3.3 weeks. The majority of respite residents (77%) return to the community, but 16% continue in residential care (either permanent care or additional respite care).

Introduction

This report presents statistics on the Australian residential aged care system over the period 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008. It is the eleventh such report in the Aged care statistics series produced by the Ageing and Aged Care Unit of the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, under an agreement with the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing.

Residential aged care is one of the main types of formal care delivery for frail or disabled older people administered under the *Aged Care Act* 1997. The other main types of care are provided through Community Aged Care Packages (CACP), flexible care provided through Extended Aged Care at Home Packages (EACH), Extended Aged Care at Home Dementia Packages (EACH Dementia), Innovative Care, and Transition Care Places (TCP). Multi-purpose Services (MPS) also provide residential places and community aged care.

Government planning of service provision aims to maintain a national provision level of operational aged care places and packages for every 1,000 people aged 70 years and over, across the programs administered under the *Aged Care Act 1997*. The current provision target is 113 places and packages per 1,000 persons aged 70 years and over, to be achieved by June 2011. In addition, the planning process aims to provide access to an array of care options to meet the needs and preferences of care recipients.

From a service use perspective, access to assistance from each of these types of care requires approval from a multidisciplinary Aged Care Assessment Team (ACAT). ACATs operate throughout Australia as a single point of entry to these aged care services, and also act as a source of advice and referral about other community services. In addition, care recipients may sometimes receive assistance from more than one aged care program, for example, a CACP and residential respite care. As their care needs change, care recipients may also move from one program of assistance to another, for example, from a CACP to an EACH.

Residential aged care

The Australian Government funds aged care facilities to provide residential aged care to older Australians whose care needs are such that they can no longer remain in their own homes. Facilities provide suitable accommodation and related services (such as laundry, meals and cleaning) and personal care services (such as assistance with the activities of daily living). Nursing care and specialised equipment are provided to residents requiring such assistance.

Residential respite gives short-term care in aged care facilities on a planned or emergency basis.

Community care and flexible care

There is a continuing strong emphasis on the provision of innovative and flexible community care to help people stay in their own homes. The largest source of community care assistance is provided through the Australian Government and state/territory funded Home and Community Care (HACC) program administered under the *Home and Community Care Act 1985*. In 2007–08, an estimated 831,500 people received assistance from the HACC program.

Community care in the person's home is also provided as tailored packages through CACP. These packages provide care for frail or disabled older people whose dependency and complex care needs would qualify them for entry to an aged care facility, at least for low-level care. They are complemented by EACH and EACH Dementia, whose aim is to deliver care at home that is

equivalent to high-level residential care. EACH Dementia are individually tailored packages of care for approved care recipients who have complex care needs because of behavioural and psychological symptoms of dementia that affect their ability to live independently in the community.

Transition Care Places (TCP) are relatively new and are jointly funded by the Australian Government and the state and territory governments. TCP provide time-limited, goal-oriented and therapy-focused care for older people after a hospital stay. TCP provide older people with a package of services that includes low-intensity therapy (such as physiotherapy), care management, and either nursing support and/or personal care. Transition care can be provided for up to 12 weeks (with a possible extension of another 6 weeks) in either a home-like residential setting or in a person's home. The places are aimed at older people who would otherwise be eligible for residential aged care, and gives them and their families and carers time to consider long-term care arrangements. It also aims to optimise the independent functioning of these older people prior to their making longer term arrangements.

Multi-purpose Services (MPS) are also a joint initiative between the Australian Government and those states and territories that need such services. They deliver a mix of aged care, health and community services in rural and remote communities, many of which cannot sustain separate services. The services may be delivered at central locations or in the local community.

In addition, flexible models of care are provided under the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flexible Aged Care Program. The services funded under this program provide culturally appropriate aged care, mainly in rural and remote areas. Services delivered under this program are outside the *Aged Care Act* 1997.

Structure of the report

This publication is primarily concerned with residential aged care. However, the first chapter on provision of aged care places also includes data about CACP, EACH and EACH Dementia, and TCP.

Chapter 2 reports data on the number, size and location of residential aged care services, while Chapter 3 looks at patterns of service use by residents, including admissions and separations. Chapter 4 describes characteristics of residents as at 30 June 2008, and characteristics of newly admitted and separated residents during 2007–08.

Four appendixes provide additional time series data, population data, details of important changes in the aged care system and notes on the data and their limitations.

Cases where data are not applicable, unknown or not reported have been excluded in relevant calculations of percentages and rates presented in the text, and may create minor variance to the totals in relevant tables.

1 Aged care provision

1.1 Operational places and packages

Residential aged care provision increased in absolute terms from 170,071 operational places at 30 June 2007 to 175,472 places at 30 June 2008 (Table 1.1). In the same period the provision of CACP rose from 37,997 to 40,280. Available packages for EACH and EACH Dementia increased from 3,302 and 1,271 respectively, at 30 June 2007 to 4,244 and 1,996 at 30 June 2008.




Figure 1.1: Number of new aged care places, CACP, EACH and EACH Dementia allocated to approved providers, 1995–96 to 2007–08

As well as reporting provision by mainstream services, the data in this section of the report also incorporate aged care places and packages delivered by flexible care through MPS and places and packages provided under the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flexible Aged Care Program. The exception is the data about allocated places (Figure 1.1), which only include mainstream service allocations.

In 2004, the Australian Government increased the planning target for aged care provision to 108 places and packages per 1,000 persons aged 70 years and over. Of these 108 places and packages, 88 were aimed at residential aged care, (40 high-care places and 48 low-care places), and 20 were CACP and EACH. The previous target was 100 places and packages per 1,000 persons aged 70 years and over, comprising 50 low-care places, 40 high-care places and 10 CACP. The provision ratio measures operational places and packages per 1,000 persons aged 70 years and over, and now also includes TCP. This target was intended to be reached by December 2008.

In February 2008, the provision ratio was further increased to 113 places and packages per 1,000 persons aged 70 years and over, to be achieved by June 2011. The intended mix was set at 44 high-care and 44 low-care places, and 25 community care packages, including four for high-level care.

The combined provision ratio declined in the late 1980s and early 1990s, but stabilised in the mid-to-late 1990s at around 93–94 places and packages per 1,000 persons aged 70 years and over (AIHW 1995; AIHW 1997). Since 2001, the ratio has risen each year as a consequence of new aged care places and packages being made available (Table 1.1; Figure 1.1).

For this report, provision ratios have been recalculated back to 2001 using revised Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) population data. The combined ratio of residential aged care places, CACP, EACH, EACH Dementia and TCP per 1,000 persons aged 70 years and over increased from 109.5 at 30 June 2007 to 111.9 at 30 June 2008. The provision ratio for residential care increased from 86.9 to 87.7. The provision ratio for other care programs also increased over this period; the CACP ratio increased from 19.4 to 20.1, and the EACH/EACH Dementia ratio increased from 2.3 to 3.1. TCP contributed 1,963 places at 30 June 2008, which added 1.0 to the Australia-wide provision ratio.

The increase in provision of places and packages over the years is in line with potential demand from an ageing population. The planning targets and the allocations of future places and packages to approved providers attempt to keep pace with potential demand. The planning process also attempts to achieve equitable distribution of services throughout the country.

1.2 State and territory variations

The residential aged care provision ratios at 30 June 2008 showed some variation by state and territory (Table 1.3). Provision ratios for residential places were highest in the Northern Territory (94.6), South Australia (94.5), and Victoria (88.4). Western Australia (83.5) and the Australian Capital Territory (76.6) had the lowest ratios of residential aged care provision.

The combined ratios of all aged care places and packages per 1,000 persons aged 70 years and over at the state/territory level were: Northern Territory (226.1), South Australia (118.2), Victoria (112.5), Tasmania (111.6), New South Wales (111.6), Queensland (109.1), Western Australia (108.0) and the Australian Capital Territory (107.4) (Table 1.3).

The Northern Territory has a much higher proportion of Indigenous and Torres Strait Islander people than other states or territories (29% compared to at most 4% in any other state or territory). As a result of the poorer health status of Indigenous Australians they need to access

aged care programs at younger ages compared to non-Indigenous Australians. If the population figures used in the denominator to calculate the places ratio include Indigenous people aged between 50 years and 69 years, as well as the general population aged 70 years and over, a different picture emerges. For the Northern Territory, the ratio for residential aged care reduces from 93.6 to 47.6, whereas the aggregate Australian ratio reduces only from 87.7 to 85.5. The combined ratio reduces from 226.1 to 113.8 in the Northern Territory, while the ratio for Australia reduces only from 111.9 to 109.2. This phenomenon is taken into account in the planning of aged care provision generally.

Provision of residential aged care places per 1,000 population aged 70+ in remoteness areas was: *Major cities* (89.2), *Inner regional* (87.2), *Outer regional* (78.3), *Remote* (83.9) and *Very remote* (103.3).

1.3 Allocated places and packages to approved provider

Aged Care Approval Rounds cater for the ongoing provision of new places and packages that are needed to achieve the planning targets, as detailed earlier. There are time lags between residential places, EACH/EACH Dementia and CACP being approved, allocated and then becoming operational. Service providers who receive an allocation of new places and/or packages are required to make them operational within 2 years or the places are either reallocated or renegotiated.

In 2007–08, the overall allocation included 2,110 low-care residential places, 4,415 high-care residential places, 2,377 CACP and 1,616 EACH/EACH Dementia packages.

Further statistics on CACP, EACH, EACH Dementia and TCP over the same reporting period will be published as a separate report in this series (AIHW 2009 forthcoming). Other detailed information about CACP and EACH care recipients and the type of assistance they receive was collected in 2002 (AIHW 2004). An updated Community Care Census was conducted early in 2008 (http://www.health.gov.au/internet/main/publishing.nsf/Content/ageing-communitycare-census-2008.htm). The results of this census are not available at the time of this publication but will provide detailed information on recent service provision through the CACP, EACH and EACH Dementia Programs as well as the National Respite for Carers Program.

2 Residential aged care services

As at 30 June 2008, there were 2,830 mainstream residential aged care services with approved places in Australia providing a total of 172,657 places. At 30 June 2007, 2,872 mainstream services delivered 167,578 places.

Australia-wide, there were 117 Multi-purpose Services, and 30 services receiving funding under the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flexible Aged Care Program. Not all these services provided packages or places.

At 30 June 2008, Multi-purpose Services provided 2,429 residential care places, and services receiving funding under the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flexible Aged Care Program provided 386 residential care places. At 30 June 2007, the comparable figures were 2,133 residential care places from Multi-purpose Services and 360 residential care places from services receiving funding under the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flexible Aged Care Program.

Because of the nature of the services provided by Multi-purpose Services and services which receive funding under the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flexible Aged Care Program, only limited data are available on these services. Consequently, the remainder of this report presents data on mainstream residential aged care services only.

The number of mainstream services has declined since 30 June 1998 when a total of 3,015 services provided residential aged care. During the same time period, the corresponding number of operational places has risen from 139,917 to 172,657. This has resulted in an increase in the average number of places per facility from 46 at 30 June 1998 to 61 at 30 June 2008.




Figure 2.1 illustrates changes in the size of aged care services since 30 June 1998. At that date, services with 61 or more places accounted for 20% of total services; at 30 June 2008, 39% of services had 61 or more places. There was a reduction in the number of services with 40 or fewer places, from 1,590 in 1998 to 891 in 2008. In 1998, 53% of services were in this size range, while in 2008 they accounted for 31% of services (Table A1.4).

The average number of places provided by aged care services differed across jurisdictions. At the larger end of the continuum were services in the Australian Capital Territory (75 places per service), New South Wales (66) and Queensland (64). Below the Australian average of 61 beds per service were South Australia (58), Western Australia (57), Victoria (57), Tasmania (51) and the Northern Territory (30) (unpublished data).

The average number of places provided by aged care services across remoteness areas related directly to the level of remoteness: *major cities* (68), *inner regional* (55), *outer regional* (41), *remote* (28) and *very remote* (16) (unpublished data). This highlights the difficulty of providing financially viable services in remote Australia.

Seventy-one per cent of services in the Australian Capital Territory had more than 60 places. In the Northern Territory, 7 of the 15 services had 20 or fewer places, and there was only one service in that Territory with more than 60 places. Tasmania also had a comparatively large proportion of small services with 20 or fewer places (15%) and 40 or fewer places (45%) (Table 2.2).


To some extent, these state/territory patterns were associated with geographic differences; 51% of services in *remote* areas and 75% of services in *very remote* areas had 20 or fewer places and most of the remainder in these regions had 40 or fewer places. In the Northern Territory, 60% of services were located in *remote* and *very remote* regions. Services in regional areas also tended to be smaller than those in *major cities*. Eighty-three per cent of services in *outer regional* areas and 68% of services in *inner regional* areas had 60 or fewer places compared with 54% of services in *major cities*. Tasmania had no services categorised in a *major city* location, while all services in the Australian Capital Territory were categorised as *major city* services (tables 2.1 and 2.3).

2.1 Type of organisation providing services

At a national level, the main providers of residential aged care services were religious organisations (29%), private providers (28%), community-based providers (17%) and charitable organisations (16%) (Table 2.4). The profile of organisational types of service providers varied considerably across states and territories (Figure 2.2). Victoria had, by far, the highest private sector involvement and a correspondingly small charitable sector. The Northern Territory, the Australian Capital Territory and Queensland had high proportions of services operated by religious organisations, at 53%, 50% and 45%, respectively, compared to the national average of 29%. Combined local and state governments had varying involvement with provision with Victoria 24%, Tasmania 13%, South Australia 12%, Queensland 6%, New South Wales 5% and Western Australia 4% (Table 2.4). There were no direct local government services in the territories.

Private and religious organisations were most highly represented in major cities at 39% and 32% respectively. Community-based services were most prominent in *remote* areas (44%), *outer regional* areas (33%) and *very remote* areas (30%) (Table 2.5).

Community and religious-based services provided over 50% of services in all remoteness areas with the exception of *major cities* (41%). The proportions of services located in *remote* and *very remote* areas by these organisations were 62% and 60% respectively.





3 Patterns of use

This section explores various aspects of residential aged care use and some of the dynamics of the system. In particular, the rates of usage of residential aged care for various population groups are discussed. Other measures of use are also provided, including occupied bed-days and average occupancy between 1 July 2007 and 30 June 2008. System dynamics are explored through reporting the two measures of length of stay, and resident turnover during the year, along with admissions to, and separations from, residential aged care.

3.1 Usage rates

Overall, usage rates for permanent residential aged care increase with age. They are higher for women than men, particularly among older age groups. At 30 June 2008, those aged 85 years and over had the highest rate of use, at 235.5 persons per 1,000, continuing the general decrease in usage rates by people in this age group since 1998. The corresponding measures for the age groups 80–84 and 75–79 were 78.5 and 32.3 per 1,000, respectively. Generally, usage rates in the age groups over 70 years were lower in 2008 compared with 1998 (Table A1.3).

Age-specific usage rates for permanent residential aged care have also been calculated for different subgroups in the Australian population.

Usage rates for the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population also rise with age. However, the usage rates for Indigenous Australians are considerably higher at younger ages than for the non-Indigenous population. The overall usage rates in those aged 75 years and over were slightly higher for Indigenous Australians, but the female rate was lower and the male rate higher than the corresponding rates for non-Indigenous Australians (Table 3.4).

Usage rates by the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population, at 30 June 2008, were 17.7 per 1,000 Indigenous persons aged 65–69 years, 27.5 per 1,000 aged 70–74 years, and 110.2 per 1,000 aged 75 years and over. By comparison, rates for non-Indigenous people were lower: 5.9 per 1,000 non-Indigenous persons aged 65–69 years, 12.9 per 1,000 aged 70–74 years, and 102.3 per 1,000 aged 75 years and over. For those aged 75 years and over, the female Indigenous usage rate was 118.0 per 1,000 compared with 129.7 for non-Indigenous females. In this age group, the usage rates for males were reversed; the male Indigenous usage rate was 98.7 per 1,000 compared with 63.7 for non-Indigenous males (Table 3.4).

The number of Australian-born people receiving permanent care at 30 June 2008 was estimated to be 55.6 per 1,000 persons aged 75–84 years and 242.3 per 1,000 aged 85 years and over. The corresponding rates for English-speaking people who were born overseas were lower at 47.8 and 236.9 per 1,000 respectively, and the corresponding usage rates for overseas-born people whose main language was not English were even lower at 45.1 and 201.5 per 1,000 respectively. Overall, usage rates were highest for Australian-born people in all age groups (Table 3.3). It is believed that overseas-born Australians have a stronger preference for providing aged care within a family setting and this is supported by usage rates in community care programs (AIHW 2009 forthcoming).

3.2 Resident-occupied place-days

During the 12-month period from 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008, 58.1 million place-days were used in aged care services in Australia, consisting of 56.9 million place-days for permanent care and 1.2 million place-days for respite care (Table 3.5). Just over 2% of occupied place-days were used for respite purposes. Respite days compared with total days varied somewhat across the states and territories, with the smallest proportions provided in Queensland and Western Australia (1.3% and 1.5%, respectively). Higher proportions were seen in both New South Wales and the Australian Capital Territory (2.6%), with the highest being in the Northern Territory (5.9%). The corresponding rate for respite-occupied place-days also varied with remoteness, from 1.9% in major cities to 3.8% in very remote areas (Table 3.5).

3.3 Occupancy

The overall occupancy rate ranged from 92% in Victoria and the Northern Territory to 97% in South Australia (Table 3.6). Australia-wide, the occupancy rate was 94%, a slight decrease from the previous year (95%). The occupancy rate was 93% in *major cities*, 95% in *inner regional* areas and 94% in *outer regional* areas. It was 90% in *remote* areas and 80% in *very remote* areas.

Between 1998–99 and 2007–08, the occupancy rate at the national level has oscillated in a narrow band between 94% and 96% but with a declining trend since 2002–03. Over the decade, the Northern Territory, Victoria and Western Australia have shown relatively lower occupancy rates, with averages over the 10 years of 94%, 94% and 95%, respectively. On the other hand, South Australia, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory have had relatively higher occupancy rates, averaging 97%, 97% and 96% respectively (Table A1.5).

3.4 Length of stay

Two standard measurements related to length of stay are the total or completed length of stay of a separated resident up to the point of leaving residential aged care, and the length of stay of an existing resident up to a particular point in time (in this publication, up to 30 June 2008). In measuring complete length of stay, a resident's move from one service to another in less than 2 days (a transfer) is ignored, and the admission date used in the measure is the earlier admission date. For existing residents, length of stay is an incomplete measure, showing the time that residents have already spent in residential aged care, but not how much more time will be spent before leaving.

The distribution of length of stay for existing permanent residents at 30 June 2008 was towards longer periods of stay (Table 3.7). Only 7% of permanent residents had been in residential aged care for less than 3 months, while 19% had been resident for between 3 months and 1 year, 52% for 1 to 5 years and 21% for 5 years or more.

For completed length of stay, 18% of permanent residents stayed less than 3 months, 19% stayed between 3 months and 1 year, 44% for 1 to 5 years, and 18% for 5 years or more (Table 3.9).

The average (mean) length of stay for permanent residents leaving residential care between 1 July 2007 and 30 June 2008 was 170.4 weeks for women and 109.8 weeks for men. In aggregate, the average length of stay was 147.8 weeks (Table 3.10). The length of stay of residents at the time of separation varied among the states and territories. Permanent separations in the

Northern Territory had the longest average length of stay (172.6 weeks) and those in New South Wales had the shortest (143.6 weeks).

For those who left respite care during the year under review, the average length of stay was 3.3 weeks (Table 3.11). In this group, the average length of stay varied from 2.2 weeks in Tasmania to 3.8 weeks in New South Wales.

The longest average length of stay was in *very remote* areas (3.9 weeks), with the lowest in *remote* areas at 2.7 weeks. *Major cities* had an average length of respite stay of 3.5 weeks (Table 3.11).

From 1998–99 to 2007–08, average completed length of stay for permanent residents has increased overall from 131.3 weeks to 147.8 weeks. On the other hand, average completed length of stay for respite care had initially declined and then stabilised at 3.1 weeks, before increasing in 2006–07 and 2007–08 to 3.3 weeks (Table 3.1).

3.5 Turnover

The amount of turnover in the system is a function of the number of admissions, length of stay and the overall growth or reduction in the size of the system. Generally, the turnover for permanent and respite residents have been relatively stable over the 10 years to 2007–08 and fluctuated in narrow bands according to changes in these factors and limitations in the method of calculation (see footnote to Table 3.2).

Approximately one-third of permanent places are associated with new admissions in a year, whereas nominal respite places are used by about 15 to 17 people per year (Table 3.2).

3.6 Admissions and separations

Permanent care

There were 105,030 admissions to residential aged care between 1 July 2007 and 30 June 2008, of which 51% (53,737) were for permanent care. In 1998–99, there were fewer (86,064) admissions, but nearly the same proportion (53%), were admissions for permanent care (Table 3.2). Between 1 July 2007 and 30 June 2008 there were 105,099 separations from residential aged care. Separations after a period of permanent care totalled 53,819, which accounted for 51% of total separations. There were fewer separations in 1998–99 (85,018), but a similar proportion (52%), were after a period of permanent care (Table 3.1).

The reasons for separation are given as: death, return to community, admission to hospital, move to another aged care service and other. For 2007–08, 1.6% of permanent separations were classified as 'other'.

In 2007–08, for those persons whose reason for separation was specified, death was the major reason for separation from permanent care (89%), while 3% returned to the community, 4% moved to a different residential aged care setting and 4% were discharged to hospitals (Table 3.13). Among those who died, 17% had stayed for less than 3 months, 19% for between 3 months and 1 year, 45% for 1 to 5 years and 19% for 5 years or more. People leaving residential aged care after a shorter period of stay were more likely to return to the community and less likely to die in residential aged care than those with longer periods of stay (Table 3.15).

There was also variation across states and territories with respect to outcome on separation. After excluding 'other' separations, Tasmania, South Australia and the Australian Capital Territory had the highest percentage of permanent separations through death (96%, 94% and 94% respectively), while Western Australia and the Northern Territory had the lowest percentage of separations through death (84% and 87%, respectively). Western Australia and the Northern Territory had the highest percentage separating to hospital (6%) (Table 3.13).

Respite care

On 30 June 2008, respite residents made up 2% of all residents (tables 4.2 and 4.4). The figure under-represents the importance of respite care, however, as it accounted for some 49% of the 105,030 admissions from 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008 (Table 3.2). This is explained by the short-term nature of respite care; while there were a large number of admissions for respite care (51,293) over the course of the 12-month period, there were relatively few respite residents at any one point in time. For example, there were 3,163 respite residents at 30 June 2008 (Table 4.4).

About 16% of respite separations had an unspecified reason for separation from residential care (Table 3.14). Of those persons for whom the reason on separation was specified, 77% returned to the community, 5% were discharged to hospitals and 2% died. Continuation of residential care was given as the reason for 16% of those separating from respite care. These residents may be moving to permanent care, either in the same service or a new service, or they may be receiving additional respite care in a new service.

For respite residents, state and territory variations in destination on separation were also evident (Table 3.14). After excluding those with an unspecified destination, Tasmania, the Northern Territory, Victoria and the Australian Capital Territory had the highest proportions returning to the community (91%, 83%, 82% and 82%, respectively), while South Australia and New South Wales had the lowest (72% and 70%, respectively). A common pattern is that those states and territories with lower rates of return to the community tended to have higher rates of movement to another residential aged care service. Excluding unknown data, New South Wales, Western Australia and South Australia had higher rates of moving to further residential aged care and lower rates of returning to the community. The reason for this requires further investigation.

4 Resident characteristics

4.1 Residents at 30 June 2008

There were 160,250 residents in mainstream residential aged care services at 30 June 2008, compared with 156,549 residents in aged care services at 30 June 2007 and 135,991 residents at 30 June 2000 (tables 4.2 and A1.1). Over half (55%) of the residents in aged care services at 30 June 2008 were aged 85 years and over, and over one-quarter (27%) were aged 90 years and over. At 30 June 2000, 50% were aged 85 years and over, and 23% were aged 90 years and over (Table A1.1 and AIHW 2001). Nationally, there were 6,752 residents aged less than 65 years accommodated in aged care services, comprising 4% of all residents (Table 4.2).

This pattern was similar across the states and territories, with the exception of the Northern Territory, where just 32% of residents were aged 85 years and over, and 11% were aged less than 65 (Table 4.2). Residents of services in *remote* and *very remote* areas tended to have a younger age profile, with 44% of residents aged 85 years and over in *remote* areas, and 35% aged 85 years and over in *very remote* areas (Table 4.5). The different age profile in the Northern Territory is to be expected given the relatively high proportion of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples living in that territory and in the light of their poorer health across age groups. Aged care planning for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples includes the general 70 plus population and the Indigenous population aged between 50 and 69 years.

In *remote* areas, 9% of residents were under 65 years of age, while in *very remote* areas 21% of residents were under 65 years of age. In other regions, the representation of this age group was nearer the national average of 4% (Table 4.5).

Permanent residents

The majority (98%) of residents in aged care services on 30 June 2008 were permanent residents (157,087) (Table 4.3). Over half (55%) of permanent residents were aged 85 years and over, and 71% of permanent residents were women (Table 4.3). Female residents were on average older than male residents; 60% of female residents were 85 years of age or older, compared with 41% of male residents.

Marital status

About 98% of permanent residents at 30 June 2008 had their marital status recorded at their admission time. Excluding those with unknown status, 56% were widowed at the time of admission, 26% were either married or in a de facto relationship, 10% had never married and 8% were divorced or separated (Table 4.6). Female permanent residents were over two times as likely to be widowed than their male counterparts (68% compared with 28%), and less than half as likely to be married or in a de facto relationship (19% compared with 43%).

A much lower proportion of permanent residents in the Northern Territory were in a married or de facto relationship (18%) compared with any other jurisdiction. Other states and territories had around 26% of newly admitted residents in a married or de facto relationship.

Data about current marital status are not available.

Indigenous status

Of the 97% of permanent residents for whom data on Indigenous status were recorded, 912 (0.6%) identified as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (Table 4.8). Only 57% of Indigenous permanent residents were female, compared with 71% of non-Indigenous residents.

The Northern Territory reported the highest proportion of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples among its permanent residents (36%). Although Queensland recorded only 1% of permanent residents as being Indigenous, it had the highest number of Indigenous residents (239), followed closely by Western Australia (233).

Pension status

A high proportion of permanent residents were in receipt of a government pension, with 71% receiving a Centrelink pension, and 18% an Australian Government Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) pension (Table 4.10). Similar proportions of female and male permanent residents were receiving Centrelink pensions (71% females, 70% males) or DVA pensions (18% females, 19% males).

Self-funded retirees comprised 9% of permanent residents and there was little difference between males and females. The Australian Capital Territory had a much higher proportion of self-funded retirees (21%) among its permanent residents compared with other states and territories. The only states with proportions of self-funded retirees similar to or above the Australian average of 9% were New South Wales (10%), Western Australia (9%) and Victoria (9%). Queensland (8%), Tasmania (8%), the Northern Territory (7%) and South Australia (7%) had the lowest proportion of self-funded retirees.

Concessional, assisted and supported residents

People with relatively low levels of income and assets have long been recognised as a group who need assistance to access residential aged care. The financial criteria for assessing eligibility for such assistance altered significantly in October 1997 with the passing of the *Aged Care Act* 1997 and again in March 2008 with the *Aged Care Amendment Act* 2008.

Financially disadvantaged persons who were admitted as permanent residents prior to the October 1997 reforms received assistance with their care fees.

The terms 'concessional' and 'assisted' applied to financially disadvantaged permanent residents admitted between 1 October 1997 and 20 March 2008. Residents who met the eligibility criteria for concessional status (see Appendix 4) were eligible for a concessional supplement which was paid to the service provider. Concessional residents were exempt from accommodation charges or bonds. The supplement for assisted residents was lower and, unlike a concessional resident, an assisted resident may have been required to pay an accommodation bond or an accommodation charge, subject to certain conditions.

From 20 March 2008 the term 'supported' resident applies to financially disadvantaged permanent residents admitted from that date. Existing residents prior to 20 March 2008 retain their conditions and benefits for being financially disadvantaged unless they separate from residential aged care for more than 28 days (see tables 4.11 and 4.12).

The eligibility to be a supported resident is simplified to an assets test. Fully supported residents are analogous to concessional residents but a sliding scale of accommodation charges applies as assets increase. Partially supported residents pay some level of accommodation charge depending on their assets (see Appendix 4).

Services are expected to meet regional targets for places for concessional, assisted and supported residents. These targets range from 16 per cent to 40 per cent and are calculated using the Socio-Economic Indexes for Areas (SEIFA) applied to aged care planning regions.

The population of permanent residents at 30 June 2008 includes permanent residents who were admitted prior to the 1997 reforms, permanent residents admitted during the period between 1 October 1997 and 20 March 2008 and permanent residents admitted during the period between 20 March 2008 and 30 June 2008. These three groups are separated in tables 4.11 and 4.12.

Omitting the 'pre-reform' group, 36% of permanent residents at 30 June 2008 were receiving financial assistance, disaggregated as concessional (29%), assisted (3%), supported (2%) and partially supported (1%). The Northern Territory had the highest proportion of permanent residents receiving assistance (67%) and the Australian Capital Territory had the lowest proportion (29%). All other jurisdictions had aggregate proportions close to the national average (36%).

Geographically, the proportions of residents receiving assistance increased with the level of remoteness: *major cities* (35%), *inner regional* (36%), *outer regional* (40%), *remote* (48%) and *very remote* (62%).

Country of birth and preferred language

Over 99% of all permanent residents had their birthplace and preferred language recorded before admission. Of these, about 27% of residents were born overseas, including 11% in the United Kingdom and Ireland, and 11% in other areas of Europe (Table 4.13).

Western Australia and the Australian Capital Territory had the highest proportions of overseas-born permanent residents (39% and 34%, respectively) and Tasmania had the lowest (16%) (Table 4.13).

Nationally, 90% of permanent residents indicated that English was their preferred language, while 9% preferred other European languages (Table 4.15). Among states and territories, the Northern Territory had the highest proportion preferring a language other than English, with 32% expressing this preference (including 23% who preferred an Australian Indigenous language). Queensland and Tasmania reported small proportions of permanent residents preferring a language other than English (3%). Of the 15,139 permanent residents who preferred to speak a language other than English, the majority lived in New South Wales (5,638) and Victoria (5,386).

Respite residents

Only 3,163 residents in aged care services on 30 June 2008 were receiving respite care, representing 2% of all residents (Table 4.4). The age profile of respite residents was younger than that of permanent residents. Only 47% of respite residents were aged 85 years and over, with a further 39% aged 75–84 years. A lower proportion of respite residents were female (64%) compared with permanent residents (71%).

The age–sex profile of respite residents varied across states and territories. The Northern Territory had the highest proportion (21%) of respite residents under 65 years of age. South Australia had the smallest proportion (2%) in this age group, while other states and territories were closer to the national average (4.6%) (Table 4.4). In the Northern Territory only 24% of respite residents were aged 85 years and over. The age profile of respite residents was oldest in

Tasmania, where 58% of residents were aged 85 years and over. Other states and territories were closer to the national average (47%).

For those who had marital status recorded, a higher proportion of respite residents were either married or in a de facto relationship (34%) compared with permanent residents (26%) (tables 4.6 and 4.7). A slightly smaller proportion of respite residents compared with permanent residents were widowed, but this group still comprised more than half of respite residents (54%).

Indigenous status was reported for all respite residents, with 0.9% identifying as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (Table 4.9).

Thirty per cent of respite residents were born overseas, and their country of birth profile was similar to that for permanent residents. Excluding unknown cases, 90% of respite residents indicated that English was their preferred language, while 8% preferred other European languages, especially Southern European languages (4%) (tables 4.14 and 4.16).

4.2 Newly admitted residents 2007–08

There were 52,641 people admitted at least once to residential aged care services for permanent care during 2007–08, and 37,085 people were admitted for respite care at least once during the same period (tables 4.20 and 4.21).

People admitted for respite care were slightly younger than those admitted for permanent care, with 69% of respite admissions aged 80 years and over compared with 73% of permanent admissions (tables 4.18 and 4.19). There has been a steady increase in the proportion of newly admitted residents aged 80 years and over. In 1998–99, 60% of people admitted for respite care, and 64% of people admitted for permanent care, were aged 80 years and over (Table A1.2).

Permanent residents admitted between 1 July 2007 and 30 June 2008 were more likely to be married or in a de facto relationship (32%), compared with all permanent residents on 30 June 2008 (26%) (tables 4.6 and 4.20). While the vast majority of people admitted for permanent or respite care were either married or widowed, those admitted for respite care were more likely to be married than those admitted for permanent care (37% and 32%, respectively) (tables 4.20 and 4.21).

A high proportion of newly admitted residents had been living in a house or flat before admission during the reporting period; 79% of permanent residents and 88% of respite residents for whom these data were reported (tables 4.22 and 4.23).

For those permanent residents where information about prior outside living arrangements were relevant and available, 50% of admitted permanent residents lived alone before their admission, 46% lived with family and 4% lived with others (Table 4.24). Residents admitted for respite care differed considerably from those admitted for permanent care with regard to their living arrangements. While residents admitted for respite care were less likely to be living alone than those admitted for permanent care, it is noteworthy that 40% of respite admissions were for people living alone at the time of entry (Table 4.25). This was particularly true of women; 48% of women admitted for respite were living alone compared with 26% of men.

The proportion of newly admitted permanent residents who were receiving an Australian Government DVA pension was marginally higher, at 20%, than for all permanent residents at 30 June 2008 (18%). The corresponding proportions of people receiving a Centrelink pension were 68% and 71%, respectively (tables 4.26 and 4.10).

4.3 Care levels of residents

Resident dependency levels were determined by the Resident Classification Scale (RCS) up to 20 March 2008. The RCS has eight categories which represent eight levels of care in descending order of need from 1 to 8. The level of Australian Government care subsidy is based on the level of care need indicated by each RCS category. No basic subsidy is paid for residents in category RCS 8. Categories 1 to 4 represent high-care status and categories 5 to 8 represent low-care status.

From 20 March 2008, the Aged Care Funding Instrument (ACFI) was introduced as a new funding model for residential aged care. A description of this new model may be found at http://www.health.gov.au/acfi and it is also briefly discussed in the *Report on the Operations of the Aged Care Act 1997* (1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008), which may be viewed at http://www.health.gov.au/internet/main/publishing.nsf/Content/ageing-reports-acarep-2008.htm.

The ACFI attempts to separate and measure only those care elements that most contribute to the cost of care. Each resident is appraised in respect of three domains: Activities of Daily Living, Behaviour Characteristics and Complex Health Care Needs (see Appendix 3). Scores in each of these domains determine the level of care (high, medium or low) for that domain, and the overall level of resident subsidy is derived from this. The concepts of ACFI high care and ACFI low care are defined through various combinations of scores in the three domains, and this enables an approximate comparison with RCS high care and RCS low care.

All new permanent admissions after 20 March 2008 are appraised using the ACFI. Existing residents before 20 March 2008 will be appraised by the ACFI if and when the requirement for a review of their current classification occurs.

This year's report thus covers both classification systems, since only approximately one-third of the latest client appraisals at 30 June 2008 were ACFI appraisals. The ACFI will replace the RCS completely by April 2009.

Of the 153,995 permanent residents at 30 June 2008 who had an accessible current appraisal recorded on the database, 106,657 were RCS appraisals and 47,338 were ACFI appraisals. Among those with a RCS appraisals, 70% were in RCS high-care categories (RCS 1 to 4) and 30% in low-care categories (RCS 5 to 8), whereas among those with an ACFI appraisal, 76% were evaluated as high care and 24% as low care.

Residents with a Resident Classification Scale score

This year's reporting of the RCS covers a sufficiently large proportion of permanent clients for many of the trends which have been evident over the last 10 years to be further reinforced in the current data.

RCS categories 1, 2 and 3 comprised the highest proportion of permanent residents (24%, 24% and 16%, respectively). The lowest level of care (RCS 8) contained 0.3% of residents at 30 June 2008 (Table 4.28).

Tables 4.29a and 4.30a both look at resident dependency at 30 June 2008, but the former focuses on younger ages and the latter on older ages. Among older residents (65 years and over) there were few differences between men and women in relation to dependency levels except in the 95 years and over age group, where 27% of women were RCS 1 but only 19% of men were at this level. A higher proportion of younger residents than older residents were classified as high

dependency. For example, 50% of residents aged under 40 years were classified RCS 1 compared with 22% for residents aged 65 years and above. Generally, in these younger age groups, the proportions of residents in each age group who are classified as RCS 1 or RCS 2 declined with increasing age.

Between 30 June 1998 and 30 June 2008, there was a consistent increase in the proportion of residents classified as high care (RCS 1 to 4), from 58% to 70%, while the proportion of those classified as low care (RCS 5 to 8) fell from 42% to 30% (Table 4.1). This decline has been most marked in RCS 8, reflecting an increasing emphasis on providing services to those with personal care needs, rather than primarily accommodation needs. From 1998 to 2008, the proportion in RCS 8 has dropped from 5% to 0.3% and the proportion in other low care (RCS 5 to 7) has dropped from 38% to 30% (Table 4.1). Residential care places have thus been provided to a progressively more dependent group of people. During this same period, the supply of Community Aged Care Packages, aimed at providing the equivalent of low-care residential support to people still living in their homes, has expanded significantly. This pattern is in keeping with established government policy, which aims to provide a greater proportion of care for people in their homes who would otherwise be eligible for low-care residential support.

The dependency profile of newly admitted residents during 2007–08 provides a useful indication of possible future trends in residential care. The dependency levels of admitted permanent residents during the period suggest that we may expect similar proportions of people in residential aged care at high-care levels in the future. Sixty-three per cent of admitted permanent residents were classified as high care and 37% as low care (Table 4.27a). The proportion of those admitted as high-care residents is lower than for existing residents (70%), as admitted residents are, by definition, at the beginning of their residential aged care stay—some will progress to higher levels of dependency during the course of their stay.

The increase in dependency in many residents during their stay in aged care is apparent when we consider that 21% of new admissions were categorised as RCS 1, but 24% of current residents at the end of June 2008 were in the RCS 1 category, and 39% of separations during that year were in that category (tables 4.27a, 4.30a and 4.32a).

Residents with an Aged Care Funding Instrument appraisal

There were 47,338 permanent residents with ACFI appraisals at 30 June 2008—approximately one-third of permanent residents at that date. The early trends occurring may be different from results which would be available if every permanent resident had an ACFI appraisal at that date. In addition, the ACFI appraisal for some residents may change following review of the accuracy of some classifications which occurs as part of Government funding accountability requirements.

Admissions with an ACFI appraisal

This applies to admissions with the introduction of the ACFI from the 20 March 2008 to 30 June 2008. There were 14,356 client admissions in the period with at least one ACFI appraisal.

An ACFI appraisal results in scores of high, medium, low or nil in each of the three domains: Activities of Daily Living (ADL care), Mental and Behavioural Diagnosis (BEH) and Complex Health Care (CHC).

For ADL care, 30% of new admissions were classified as high care, 30% as medium and 32% as low. Only 8% of clients required no ADL care. A higher proportion of clients did not require


BEH care (19%) but 31% required high care in this domain. For CHC care, a low proportion of admissions required high care (19%) with 56% needing low or nil care (tables 4.27b, 4.27c and 4.27d).

Across age groups, the proportion requiring high ADL care in the 95+ age group was noticeably higher (39%) than for other age groups which were all closer to the average of 30% (Table 4.31b).

Residents as at 30 June 2008 with an ACFI appraisal

Compared with new admissions, a higher proportion of residents with an ACFI appraisal at 30 June 2008 had higher levels of care requirements in relation to ADL and BEH care (tables 4.28b and 4.28c). Thirty-four per cent of residents required high care with ADL and 35% with BEH care. The distribution of care level for CHC care was similar to that of admissions. Only 14% required high level care and 57% required either low care or had no CHC care needs. The increased care need of residents in the younger age group (<65) compared to the overall population was also marked in some domains. Forty-three per cent of residents under age 65 required high level BEH care compared to the overall proportion of 35% (tables 4.29c and 4.30c). The same difference occurred with CHC care where the corresponding proportions were 21% and 14% (tables 4.29d and 4.30d).

Figure 4.1 shows the proportions in the care levels for each of the domains of care at 30 June 2008.



Health conditions

With the introduction of the ACFI, it is possible, for the first time, to report on resident health conditions. Such reporting is only available for residents with an ACFI appraisal.

Table 4.34 lists the top 10 main health categories (excluding dementia and other mental illness) for permanent residents at 30 June 2008 who had an ACFI classification. Eighty-six per cent of such residents (47,338) were in the top 10 categories. Thirty per cent of residents in this group had circulatory diseases listed as their main health condition. Circulatory diseases include heart disease, cerebrovascular disease and hypertension. Diseases of the musculoskeletal system and connective tissue which includes rheumatoid arthritis and osteoarthritis were the main condition for 17% of residents.

Diagnoses of dementia and other mental illnesses are recorded separately from other illnesses in the database. Excluding missing data, sixty three per cent of residents had at least one diagnosis of dementia (Table 4.35). From this reporting it cannot be inferred that dementia is the primary health condition of the client.

Coding of health conditions in the ACFI come from those used in the Aged Care Assessment Program and these codes map to equivalent codes in the International Statistical Classification of Diseases and Related Health Problems – Tenth Revision – Australian Modification (1998) (also known as ICD–10–AM).

Appendix 3 Aged Care Funding Instrument

The Aged Care Funding Instrument (ACFI) replaced the Residential Classification Scale (RCS) for determining the level of care payments for residents in aged care homes from 20 March 2008. It is designed to provide a simpler method which better matches funding to the needs of people with dementia and those with complex health care requirements. All new permanent admissions from 20 March 2008 are appraised using the ACFI and conversion from the RCS for existing residents will take place as residents require a review of their classification.

The ACFI measures the need for care through the use of standard assessment tools and the completion of ACFI checklists. It involves the appraisal of residents in relation to three separate domains which are considered to contribute to the costs of care: Activities of Daily Living, Behaviour supplement, and Complex Health Care supplement. Each of these domains has three funded levels – low, medium and high. In addition there is a 'lowest applicable classification level' in each domain which results in nil funding.

- Activities of Daily Living (ADL) evaluates client needs with nutrition, mobility, personal hygiene, toileting and continence.
- Mental and Behavioural Diagnosis (BEH) assesses resident care needs in respect of cognitive skills, wandering, verbal behaviour, physical behaviour and depression.
- Complex Health Care (CHC) measures the needs of a client for medication and complex health care.

In addition there are two categories of health condition diagnosis (Mental and Behavioural, and Medical) which result in a record of diagnosed disorders. Diagnosis data is used to support other ratings and to determine whether supplementary funding is required.

ACFI classifications will be defined as high or low care. In order to be considered high care, the resident must be classified at one or more of the following levels:

- Medium or High in the CHC supplement
- Medium or High in the ADL domain
- High in the BEH supplement.

If a resident appraisal score does not satisfy these conditions, they will be classified as low care.

ACFI classifications will not generally expire, except in certain circumstances including:

- six months after a resident enters care directly from hospital
- six months after a major change in care needs
- upon return from extended hospital leave
- six months after return from extended hospital leave
- upon departure from care.

Following implementation of the ACFI, Aged Care Assessment Teams will continue to make recommendations for either high- or low-level residential care.

Appendix 4 Financial support arrangements

Prior to the *Aged Care Act 1997*, financially disadvantaged persons (FDPs) were a defined special needs group and limitations on allowable charges on their pension payments facilitated access to residential aged care.

The Aged Care Act 1997 introduced major changes to the structure and funding of aged care services. The principle of providing access to residential aged care to people with relatively low levels of income and assets continued to be applied through different types of concessions and assistance from 1 October 1997 up until 20 March 2008. These arrangements continue to apply to residents who were admitted to residential aged care during this period.

Residents who met the eligibility criteria for concessional status pay no accommodation charge or bond. In addition, a concessional supplement to the basic subsidy is paid to the service provider. The minimum requirements for concessional status were that the resident must:

- be receiving an income support payment
- not have owned a home for the past 2 years
- have assets of less than 2.5 times the annual single basic aged pension, rounded to the nearest \$500.

Service providers received a lower supplement for assisted residents, and, unlike a concessional resident, an assisted resident may be required to pay an accommodation bond or an accommodation charge, subject to certain conditions. The criteria for determining assisted resident status are the same as concessional resident status except that:

• an assisted resident has assets of between 2.5 and 4 times the annual single basic aged pension amount, rounded to the nearest \$500.

Supported residents

Following the *Aged Care Amendment Act 2008* clients entering permanent residential aged care are eligible to be supported residents (on or after 20 March 2008) if the value of their assets is less than \$91,410.

A client's home is excluded from this assets test if the home is occupied by persons including:

- their partner or a dependent child
- their carer, who is eligible for an income support payment, and has occupied the home for the past two years
- a close relation, who is eligible for an income support payment, and has occupied the home for the past five years.

Clients with assets of less than \$35,500 will not be required to pay an accommodation bond or charge. Clients with assets between \$35,500 and \$91,410 (partially supported residents) will be required to make a contribution to their accommodation costs.

The dollar amounts above determining supported and partially supported status will change from time to time.

For a full description of the ramifications for residents and providers about assisted and concessional status, see *The residential aged care manual* maintained by the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing and available on their website at <www.health.gov.au>.

Appendix 5 Data and their limitations

The main source of data in this report is administrative by-product data from the System for the Payment of Aged Residential Care (SPARC).

SPARC contains information gathered through a number of instruments. Among those instruments, the following three are directly relevant to this report:

- Aged Care Application and Approval a form completed by a person applying for admission to an aged care service or by someone (normally a carer) on behalf of the applicant.
- Application for Classification a form containing client evaluation on the Resident Classification Scale (RCS) and completed by the aged care service to determine the resident's overall level of care needs (used up to 20 March 2008). From 20 March 2008, this form was revised to adjust to client appraisal using the Aged Care Funding Instrument (ACFI).
- Monthly Claim Form—a form for claiming Australian Government benefits completed by the aged care service as part of the monthly funding cycle.

The initial transfer of this information is moving from paper copy to electronic transfer. The word 'form' thus needs to be interpreted accordingly.

Residential aged care in Australia was restructured in 1997–98. The two separate categories of residential care (nursing homes and hostels) were combined into a single program from 1 October 1997. As a result, from that date, SPARC replaced the two previous data collection systems (the Nursing Home Payment System (NHPS) and the Commonwealth Hostel Information Payment System (CHIPS)).

The new system inherited all existing records on the NHPS at 1 October 1997. For CHIPS data, only those records that related to the following two groups of people were carried over:

- Those who were in a hostel at 1 October 1997.
- Those who had a valid Aged Care Assessment Team (ACAT) assessment covering 1 October 1997, as they were regarded as potential residents.

In other words, the records for residents discharged from hostels before 1 October 1997 are not available on SPARC, although they are still available on CHIPS.

Under the amalgamated residential aged care system, length of stay refers to the period spent in the combined system, which may include both time spent under low care (previously hostel) and high care (previously nursing home). This is not comparable to combining length of stay measures from the previous separate nursing home and hostel measures of length of stay.

Population data are from the AIHW's general population databases supplied by the ABS, and other ABS published data.

Resident information

All residents admitted to residential aged care must have a valid Aged Care Application and Approval form completed by an authorised ACAT officer. This form is valid for 12 months from the date of the approval.

The information entered into SPARC from the Aged Care Application and Approval form is the major source for the following data items in the tables:

- sex
- date of birth
- marital status
- pension status
- Indigenous status
- country of birth
- preferred language
- resident's usual residence (before admission)
- resident's usual living arrangement (before admission).

Not all residents have all the above characteristics reported on SPARC.

Application for Classification

These forms are now sent directly to Medicare Australia in either electronic or paper form and processed for funding purposes according to the information provided. On the old Resident Classification Scale (RCS), a client would normally be reappraised annually on the anniversary of admission by the service provider. The RCS has been replaced with the Aged Care Funding Instrument (ACFI) from 20 March 2008 and the ACFI was phased in over a year as client RCS appraisals become due. There is no automatic reappraisal of clients in the ACFI appraisal system.

Admission and separation date

The monthly claim form is sent to approved services each calendar month, either electronically or as a paper form, as part of the payment cycle. It shows claim details for the previous month plus a forecast schedule for the current month. The service checks the information and records data on separations and absences (hospital and social leave) for these residents. It also adds information on any newly admitted residents for the current month.

The monthly claim form is also sent to Medicare Australia.

The claim form is the source for the following data items in the tables:

- date of admission
- date of separation
- separation mode
- admission type.

Calculation of provision ratios

The ratios may differ slightly from those output by the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing due to a difference in the date of calculation, the population numbers used, and the inclusion of a relatively small number of places and packages in programs not covered by the *Aged Care Act* 1997.

Populations used in the tables in this report

It should be noted that tables in this publication refer to several different sub-populations and, consequently, may not be directly comparable. The sub-populations covered in the tables in this report are summarised below. Excluding the reporting on provision, the data presented relate to mainstream services and their residents, and exclude residents in places provided by Multi-purpose Services or funded through the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flexible Aged Care Program.

Residents at 30 June 2008

All tables on this topic relate to the number of residents who were in mainstream aged care services on 30 June 2008. This population includes all approved residents and totalled 160,250.

All admissions and separations, 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008

There were 53,737 admissions for permanent care (permanent admissions) and 51,293 admissions for respite care (respite admissions) over the period from 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008. Over the same period, there were 53,819 separations of permanent residents and 51,280 separations of respite residents. Transfers within type of admission are excluded.

Admitted residents, 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008

Each person is counted once. For the full year reporting, there were 52,641 distinct resident admissions for permanent care and 37,085 distinct resident admissions for respite care. Transfers within type of admission are excluded.

Separated permanent residents, 1 July 2007 to 30 June 2008

Each person is counted once. For the full year reporting, there were 52,953 distinct resident separations. Transfers of a similar type are excluded.

Tables on dependency

The data on RCS and the ACFI invariably excludes some clients due to the time lag in data entering the warehouse from which the tables are derived, and also the programming structure which cannot allow for the full range of unusual data entry. The general trends in these tables are not altered by the missing data.

Data limitations

It should be noted that the accuracy of some specific data items may be limited. Such cases are listed below:

- A reported date of birth implying that a resident is aged less than or equal to 10 years is regarded as an input error and 100 years is added to the age. This only alters a handful of entries in any one year.
- Death indicator: in some cases, aged care services may not be equipped to care for some terminally ill residents. Accordingly, such residents are transferred to acute-care institutions before death; hence, there is an under-enumeration of discharges due to death.
- Length of stay: complete length of stay of a resident is the time between the date of admission and the date of separation. For residents at 30 June 2008, incomplete length of stay is the time between the date of admission and 30 June 2008. When a person is

- transferred from one service to another, the date of admission to the first service is the date from which the length of stay is calculated.
- The data on the number of residential places and community care packages stored in the Aged and Community Care Management Information System (ACCMIS) are sensitive to dates of entry, and ACCMIS is updated weekly from SPARC. Consequently the reader may find minor reporting variations depending on the version of ACCMIS used in the variety of reports on aspects of residential aged care.
- Information on whether an admission was from an acute hospital is not available on SPARC.

Care should be exercised in comparisons where percentages are given but some of the underlying numbers are small. For example, statements that compare the smaller states and territories with the larger states, and comparisons across remoteness areas need to be interpreted with caution.

Glossary

Aged Care Funding Instrument (ACFI)

The ACFI is a resource allocation instrument and focuses on three domains that discriminate care needs among residents. The ACFI assesses core needs as a basis for allocating funding. It was phased in over the year commencing 20 March 2008 to replace the Resident Classification Scale (RCS). See Appendix 3 for more detail.

Admission day

The first day of a person's stay in an aged care service. In the case of a person transferring between services, where the time between leaving one service and entering another is less than 2 days, it is the date of the initial admission. Permanent and respite admissions are treated separately. For example, if a person transfers from a respite stay to a permanent stay, a new permanent admission is created.

Aged Care Assessment Team (ACAT)

A multidisciplinary team of health professionals responsible for determining eligibility for entry to residential aged care.

Assisted residents

See Appendix 4.

Care recipient

A person assessed by an Aged Care Assessment Team as having significant care needs, which can be appropriately met through the provision of residential care, community care, and/or flexible care.

Concessional residents

See Appendix 4.

High-care resident

A permanent resident who was assigned to classification levels 1-4 using the Resident Classification Scale or who is appraised as ACFI high care (see Appendix 3).

Hostel for the aged

A care service in which residents receive hostel care or personal care services, unless designated as a 'co-habitee'. In this publication, all references to hostels are to hostels for the aged; that is, those hostels designed to provide services to older people. A small number of young people with disabilities live in hostels for the aged. Hostels specifically established for young people with a disability are not included in this publication. Following the introduction of the *Aged Care Act 1997*, hostels no longer exist as legal entities. Current practice in the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing is to refer to both former nursing homes and former hostels as 'residential aged care homes', 'residential aged care services' or 'residential aged care facilities'.

Length of stay

The length of stay of a separated resident is based upon the time between the date of admission and the date of separation, allowing for transfers. For a current resident, it is the time between the date of admission and 30 June 2008. The admission day and the specified day (30 June 2008) are included, but the separation day is excluded, from the calculation of length of stay.

Low-care resident

A resident who is assigned to classification levels 5–8 using the Resident Classification Scale or who is appraised as ACFI low care (see Appendix 3).

Nursing home for the aged

These include all nursing homes approved under the *National Health Act* 1963, other than nursing homes for disabled people. In this publication, all references to nursing homes are to nursing homes for the aged. There has been a small number of young people with disabilities living in nursing homes for the aged. Following the introduction of the *Aged Care Act* 1997 nursing homes no longer exist as legal entities. Current practice in the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing is to refer to both former nursing homes and former hostels as 'residential aged care homes', 'residential aged care services' or 'residential aged care facilities'.

Permanent admission

An admission to residential aged care for expected long-term care.

Permanent care

A resident in residential aged care is under permanent care if this resident entered the service as a permanent admission.

Permanent resident

A resident who is admitted to residential aged care for permanent care (long-term care).

Place-day

A day on which a care recipient is occupying a place. The day that a care recipient enters residential aged care and the day he or she leaves are counted as 1 day.

Pro-rated missing data

The missing responses in a field value are distributed amongst the numbers in the other field values in accordance with the proportions of the known field numbers

Remoteness

The remoteness classification used in this report is based on the Australian Standard Geographical Classification (ASGC) Remoteness Structure developed by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. This categorises all Census Collection Districts (CDs) in Australia according to their remoteness, based on physical road distance to the nearest urban centre. Remoteness is measured by the Accessibility/Remoteness Index of Australia (ARIA) (ABS 2001).

The structure of the classification is as follows:

Major cities CDs with an average ARIA index value of 0 to 0.2

Inner regional CDs with an average ARIA index value greater than 0.2 and less

than or equal to 2.4

Outer regional CDs with an average ARIA index value greater than 2.4 and less

than or equal to 5.92

Remote CDs with an average ARIA index value greater than 5.92 and less

than or equal to 10.53

Very remote CDs with an average ARIA index value greater than 10.53.

Resident

A person who has been assessed by an Aged Care Assessment Team as requiring residential care and who resides in an Australian government-funded aged care service.

Resident Classification Scale (RCS)

An instrument which assesses a care recipient's care needs. This scale has eight classification levels ranging from low care (RCS 8) to high care (RCS 1), with each level having a specified subsidy level which is paid to the provider for providing the required care to the care recipient. The RCS was introduced with the amalgamation of hostels and nursing homes into one system of care on 1 October 1997, replacing the Resident Classification Instrument for nursing homes and the Personal Classification Assessment Instrument for hostels. The RCS was replaced by the ACFI from 20 March 2008.

Residential aged care service

A service that consists of a number of approved places at a specific location.

Residential care

Personal and/or nursing care that is provided to a person in a residential care service in which the person is also provided with accommodation that includes meals, cleaning services, furniture and equipment. The residential aged care service must meet certain building standards and appropriate staffing in supplying the provision of that care and accommodation.

Respite admission

A short-term admission to residential aged care for respite care purposes.

Respite care

Care given as an alternative care arrangement with the primary purpose of giving the carer or a care recipient a short-term break from their usual care arrangement.

Respite resident

A resident who is admitted to residential aged care for respite care.

Separation

Occurs when a person is discharged from residential aged care and has not re-entered the same or another service within 2 days.

Separation day

The last day of a person's stay in an aged care service; that is, the day on which the person leaves the service. Transfers between services were not viewed as separations in terms of length of stay calculations if the time between leaving one service and entering another was less than 2 days.

Separation mode

Indicates the destination of or outcome for a resident at separation, including death.

Supported resident

Following the *Aged Care Amendment Act* 2008 clients entering permanent residential aged care with assets below a certain level are eligible to be supported residents (on or after 20 March 2008). The client's level of assets determines the amount of any accommodation charges they pay (see Appendix 4).

System for the Payment of Aged Residential Care (SPARC)

The current payment system for residential aged care.

Transfer

Occurs where a person leaves an aged care service and is admitted to another within 2 days.

Usual housing status

Refers to housing tenure before the resident's application for admission to residential aged care.

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
