
Alcohol, tobacco and other drugs in Australia

In 2018, tobacco use accounted for 11.9% of the burden of disease for Indigenous Australians. [1] **Smoking rates** for Indigenous Australians aged 18 and over:

• Non-remote areas declined from 55% in 1994 to 40% in 2018–19.

• **Remote areas rose slightly** from 54% in 1994 to 59% in 2018–19. [6,7]

Indigenous smoking and lifetime risky drinking: [5,7]



In the last 12 months in 2022–2023, **12%** of First Nations people **consumed 11 or more standard drinks** at least once a month and over 1 in 4 used any illicit drug:

- 17.0% used cannabis
- 7.6% used a pharmaceutical for non-medical use

• 2.7%* used methamphetamine and amphetamine.[2]

In 2022–23, **18%** of clients of **alcohol and other drug treatment services** aged 10 and over were First Nations people.[3] In 2014–15, of Indigenous Australians with a **mental health condition**:

- Almost 1 in 2 were daily smokers
- About 2 in 5 have used substances. [5]

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First Nations people aged 14 and over were slightly more likely to abstain from drinking alcohol in 2022-2023 (28%) compared to 2010 (25%).[2]

42% of First Nations mothers reported **smoking** at some time during pregnancy in 2021, down from 50% in 2011.[4]

National Drug Strategy Household Survey findings relate to people aged 14 or older unless specified. An adult is a person aged 18 or older. [2]
